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# 1 Safety Instructions

Please read this manual before you startup the rho4.1/IPC 40.2. Store this manual in a place to which all users have access at any time.

### 1.1 Intended use

This instruction manual presents a comprehensive set of instructions and information required for the standard operation of the described products. The described products are used for the purpose of operating with a robot control rho4.

The products described

- have been developed, manufactured, tested and documented in compliance with the safety standards. These products normally pose no danger to persons or property if they are used in accordance with the handling stipulations and safety notes prescribed for their configuration, mounting, and proper operation.
- · comply with the requirements of
  - the EMC Directives (89/336/EEC, 93/68/EEC and 93/44/EEC)
  - the Low-Voltage Directive (73/23/EEC)
  - the harmonized standards EN 50081-2 and EN 50082-2
- are designed for operation in industrial environments, i.e.
  - no direct connection to public low-voltage power supply,
  - connection to the medium- or high-voltage system via a transformer.

The following applies for application within a personal residence, in business areas, on retail premises or in a small-industry setting:

- Installation in a control cabinet or housing with high shield attenuation.
- Cables that exit the screened area must be provided with filtering or screening measures.
- The user will be required to obtain a single operating license issued by the appropriate national authority or approval body. In Germany, this is the Federal Institute for Posts and Telecommunications, and/or its local branch offices.
- This is a Class A device. In a residential area, this device may cause radio interference. In such case, the user may be required to introduce suitable countermeasures, and to bear the cost of the same.

### 1.5 Safety instructions for the described product

# 2 System Overview

The rho4.1/IPC 40.2 robot control consist of a powerful industrial-standard PC featuring **additional components**, e.g. UPS, temperature monitoring.


The rho4.1/IPC 40.2 consists of two with each other fix connected parts:

- In the PC-Box, the PC including harddisk and power supply with uninterruptible power supply is built in. Add-on slots for a PCI- and a PCI/ ISA-card are available. At a connector block the standard interfaces and some special interfaces are available.
- In a frame component assembled to the PC-Box, the GIGABIT4-interface as well as an alternative to XCOM1 usable V24-interface (X39) is integrated. Also five LED displaying device states and errors and a CD-ROM drive are assembled.

The assembly is compact and service friendly, it is featured by:

- high fail-safe (e.g. impact and vibration securely supported hard disk, uninterruptible power supply (UPS) and
- simple maintenance

The system is supplied with installed Microsoft Windows XP Professional and appropriate Bosch Rexroth application software (refer to section 9.2).

All specifications are subject to change as a result of technological developments. This also means that components providing higher than the specified performance (e.g. a faster processor) may be integrated in the devices without explicit reference in this documentation.

### 2.2 Expansion slots

Two slots are provided for expansion cards:

- 1 PCI bus slot
- 1 PCI/ISA bus combination slot

Expansion slot 2 is occupied by the PCI\_rho card. Busmaster cards must be inserted in slot 1 (1st slot from the bottom).



#### **CAUTION**

Damage to PC or application software through unauthorized expansion cards.


Use only approved expansion cards, and have them installed by a specialist.

### 2.3 Rechargeable battery pack

The rho4.1/IPC 40.2 is equipped with an external rechargeable battery pack.

In the case of a power failure, the battery pack facilitates a controlled shutdown of the PC operating system, as described in section 3.2 (**Uninterruptible Power Supply UPS**). Loss of data held in PC RAM is thus prevented.

The battery pack has a limited service life and must be replaced when it fails to hold a full charge (see section 8.2).

### 2.4 Operating conditions

The rho4.1/IPC 40.2 control is designed for continuous operation (24 hours/day).

Unless stated otherwise in specific sections, these specifications apply:

### **Temperatures**

### Storage temperature:

• -20 °C to +60 °C

### durability

• +5 °C to +45 °C

Ambient temperatures apply to installation described in section 4. Temperature fluctuations of up to 3  $^{\circ}$ C per minute are permitted.



#### **CAUTION**

**Excessive operating temperature!** 

Do not expose the PC to direct sunlight or other sources of heat radiation!

### Relative humidity

Climate class 3K3, as per EN 60721; condensation not permitted.

### Atmospheric pressure

To DIN 60204, when operating at altitudes up to 2000 m above sea level.

### **Protection category**

IP00

Control cabinets and installation compartments must conform to IP 54 rating (dust filters upstream of air intake and exhaust):

The ambient air must be free of electrically conductive pollutants (e.g., acids, alkali, corrosives, salts, metallic vapours, etc.).

As shipped from the factory, the rho4.1/IPC 40.2 comply with the requirements for the CE mark of conformity.

However, installing additional expansion cards will require a supplementary CE approval.

### 2.6 Wear parts

# Wear parts, which are not liable to warrantee

- CMOS-battery: 5–7 years
- Rechargeable battery pack: The number of executed load cycles of the battery pack and so its durability depend on the ambient temperature of the battery pack.

Ambient temperature is defined as the temperature, in which the control or battery pack is situated, e.g. the inside temperature of the switch cabinet.

Durability rechargeable battery pack

If you don't know the exactly thermal conditions, Bosch Rexroth advises a preventive change of the battey pack every 1,5 years.

 Hard disk: The hard disk is a electromechanic component, which wears out during operating time. It was developed for a durability of 60 month under consideration of the details of the manufacturer:

Typical operation- and storage conditions of the hard disk

The operation outside of these typical conditions is valid, but the durability of the hard disk may be decreased. But the specified ambient conditions of the complete device (see section 2.4) must be kept absolute.

• Fans are also mechanical components, which are liable to wear out and the durability in particular is temperature-sensitive. For the built in fan in the PC-box, the manufacturer specifies the following durability:

Ambient temperature	Durability

### 2.7 Compatibility check

All Bosch Rexroth controls and drives are developed and testet according to the actual state-of-the-art.

But it is impossible to watch the continuous further development of all materials our controls and drives may encounter with (e.g. lubricant at machine tools). Reactions with the material used by us cannot be excluded in each case.

On this account, you have to make a compatibility check before using our devices between new lubricants, cleaning supplies etc. and our case/device materials.

# 3 Security Functions

Each PC basic device is equipped with a temperature monitoring function and an uninterruptible power supply (UPS). The UPS only works in conjunction with an external battery pack.

### 3.1 Temperature monitoring function

The ambient air in the PC environment must not exceed +45 °C (see section 2.4). To ensure operational reliability, a temperature monitoring function keeps track of the internal housing temperature.

At internal housing **temperatures exceeding 50** °C, an overtemperature warning occurs, manifesting itself as follows:

- via the flashing red **Temp** LED at the front panel of the housing.
- via a message window displayed by the operating system.
   This message must also be interpreted by all PC application programs, and particularly by I/O processes. The Bosch Rexroth application software meets this requirement.

The above described temperature monitoring function can be disabled by means of the program UPS<sub>NT</sub> for Windows.

See also section 3.3.

In the event that internal housing **temperatures exceed 65** °C, the PC will be subject to a controlled shutdown via the UPS logic circuit (see section 3.2).



#### **DANGER**

Inadvertent machine movements.

Always ensure that temperatures remain within the noncritical range. In the case of application-sensitive procedures, ensure that machine movements are terminated in a controlled fashion before the temperature monitoring function disables the rho4.1/IPC 40.2.

### 3.2 Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS)

In the event of an internal housing temperature in excess of 65 °C (see section 3.1), the UPS logic integrated in the power supply is activated, initiating a safe operating system shutdown procedure backed by the internal rechargeable battery pack.

The battery-operation are activated, when a power interruption > 20 ms arises.

#### Please note:

- To allow the rechargeable battery pack to attain its full charge capacity, the device must remain powered up for a minimum of 5 hours subsequent to initial startup. Sufficient UPS protection cannot be ensured during this charging period.
- Frequent On/Off cycling of power tends to cause rapid discharge of the battery pack. You should never cycle the power more often than 4 times in succession. The battery pack must again be fully recharged thereafter.
- The UPS logic function requires hard disk capacity for intermediate data storage. Ensure that the hard disk never fills up completely.




#### **DANGER**

If there are no batteries in the unit, or if the batteries are defective or discharged, the PC will RESET without warning after a voltage dip in excess of 20 ms! Possible consequences loss of data.

Observe UPS program messages warning of a discharged battery pack. The relevant test is run during each PC boot phase.

### Power dropouts below 800 ms duration


Voltage drops below 800 ms duration are bridged by the battery pack, and do not trigger the UPS logic circuit.



#### Power losses between 800 ms and 60 sec with shortbreak


In the event of a power loss in excess of 800 ms, the operating system will initiate a safe shutdown of the operating system once a preselected interval (Delay Time) delay time has elapsed.

- If the mains power is restored within a 5-second interval (short break), the UPS will remain inactive (only with appropriate settings).
- If the mains power is restored within the next 60 seconds, the UPS will interrupt the operating voltage for another 8 seconds (up to t3), and then again restart the operating system.



### Power loss in excess of 60 seconds without shortbreak

After approx. 60 sec., internal UPS functions deenergized the power supply.



Refer to page 3–9 for the procedure required to adjust the Delay Time of the UPS<sub>NT</sub> supplementary software.

### 3.3 UPS program

### 3.3.1 Functionality

The uninterruptible power supply program "UPS $_{\rm NT}$ " controls and monitors the integrated uninterruptible power supply (UPS). Further on, the program offers the following functions:

- Monitoring the system temperature in the housing
- Monitoring the function of the fans
- Check of the charge state if required
- · Setting of the Profi Bus address
- Setting of the COM-Interface for the touch screen controller

Communications between program and UPS are handled via the COM4 serial port.

The program consist of two parts, a control panel applet and the actual windows service.

The task of the UPS program is to respond as follows in the event of a power loss within an adjustable time (delay time: max. 60 sec):

- By sending a message to all active applications, facilitating their safe shutdown via special application routines.
- By shutting down the operating system after the delay time has elapsed.

Once the UPS power monitoring function has been triggered, aborting the system shutdown routine is no longer possible.

Closing all active applications prevents data loss in the event of a sudden power loss.

In the event that the mains power has not been restored, the UPS will switch off the PC power supply after a maximum of 60 seconds (refer to disconnect conditions in section 3.2).



### **CAUTION**

Loss of data through manual restart!

Note that the UPS will switch off the device in any case. For this reason, once the operating system has been shut down, the "Restart" dialog button must not be selected.

In the case of power outages lasting less than 60 seconds, the operating system is restarted automatically.

At normal operation, the user has no access to the UPS<sub>NT</sub> program. Operation and configure settings is only possible with special rights (Administrator rights) and after a restart of the operating system.


Parameter values set in the UPS<sub>NT</sub> software may not be changed without prior consultation with Bosch Rexroth.

## 3.3.2 Operating and configuring UPS<sub>NT</sub>

### Start/Stop


During run-up of Windows XP the  $\ensuremath{\mathsf{UPS_{NT}}}$  program is started automatically.

If the service should be stopped, terminated or restarted (e.g. Re-Installation or Update), select Administration Tools -> Services in the Windows XP Control Panel:



Windows XP Control Panel

The actual operating state of the service is displayed in the Windows Task Bar:




- Legend: 1: Service was started, but is not yet ready
  - 2: Service is in operation
  - 3: Service is in operation, but during start errors have been signaled (Battery-, Temperature-, Fan- or Voltage error)

The status of the UPS<sub>NT</sub> service is displayed in Windows XP under Control Panel -> Administration Tools -> Services:

- UPS<sub>NT</sub> stopped: no entry
- UPS<sub>NT</sub> started: entry "Started" in column "Status"

The marked entry UPS<sub>NT</sub> Service can be stopped or started by "Stop the service" "Restart the service"

### Configuration

To configure the UPS<sub>NT</sub> program, double click the icon **UPS NT Control** in the Control Panel (see page 3–6).

The UPS<sub>NT</sub> program run always as a Windows service. Changing users has no effect to this attitude. User can not stop the program or monitoring without Administrator rights.

### **USV Properties and Maintenance**


After double clicking the icon **UPS NT Control**, the window **USV Properties and Maintenance** appear.

This window offers the following register entries with more available settings:

- UPS General
- System Health
- Profi Bus / Mode COM3
- About

### **UPS General**

After the call, first of all the register UPS General is active, where general settings of the Start- and Runtime attitude can be defined.



The register "UPS General"

After modifications of parameter, the UPS program is stopped and restarted automatically to take effect of the new settings. During this time (5...10 sec) no monitoring take place.

**COM Port:** Determines the serial communication interface, where the UPS is connected to. If in the BIOS one or more serial interfaces are disabled, the remaining interfaces are new "numbered" by Windows. This means that in the configuration dialog "COM Port" a new interface must be selected. If no interface is found during start of the service, a corresponding dialog appears and the service is terminated.

The UPS program is connected to the UPS via the COM4 serial port by default settings.

The block **Advanced Controls** offers the following settings:

**Shutdown Delay Time:** A value of 45 sec must be entered here. During this interval, the rho4.1/ IPC 40.2 application program is exited, and user data saved. Upon expiry of the Delay Time, all application programs will be terminated without security query!

During the intervening period between the end of the **Shutdown Delay Time** and the expiry of the 60 seconds after the shutdown signal, the operating system is shut down (i.e., closing and backing up Windows system files, etc.). If the interval is too short, the shutdown process will be interrupted because the UPS disrupts the mains power. This may cause loss of data in some circumstances.

#### CAUTION

Upon expiry of the Delay Time, the operating system is shut down without prior security query. Unsecured data belonging to open applications will be lost.

**Enable Startup Battery Test:** When this checkbox is activated, the system performs a test of the battery pack during each restart.

In the case of a faulty battery pack (e.g., defective battery pack, cable break, plug not connected), battery monitoring is disabled. The UPS program continues only with its temperature monitoring function.

If temperature monitoring has not been enabled, the UPS program will be terminated.

In case of an error, the rho4.1/IPC 40.2 controller will set the output designated I80.2 UPS\_ACCU\_RCO to "HIGH".

After 12 hours the battery test is automatically performed again:

 If no error appear, the test will be automatically performed every 12 hours.

 In case of an error, a dialog appear and a message is send to all active applications; no further battery test is accomplished.

**Enable Temp Control:** When this checkbox is activated, continuous monitoring of the ambient temperature is enabled. Excessive temperatures (> +50°C) will produce a warning window and the TEMP LED at the housing front starts to blink. In case of an error, the rho4.1/IPC 40.2 controller will set the output designated I80.1 UPS TEMP RCO to "HIGH". The temperature warning can be disabled.

At temperatures > +65 °C the system is shutdown and cut off by the UPS program.

The voltage monitoring function is retained even after a temperature warning.

Enable Fan Control: When this checkbox is activated, the housing- and processor-fan is monitored. In the event of an error, a message is generated and send to all active applications. The TEMP LED starts to blink.

**Enable Voltage Control:** Monitors the internal supply voltages. In the event of an error, a message is generated and send to all active applications.

No Powerdown on Shortbreak: When this checkbox is activated, interruptions in the power supply of up to 5 seconds are permitted without affecting ongoing operations. Only in case of power interruptions lasting in excess of 5 seconds will the UPS logic be started and the safe shutdown of the system initiated.

**UPS Off, Disable UPS:** This option disables both the UPS monitoring function and the power-off delay for the power supply:

- A power loss will cause the PC to shut down immediately.
- After a normal shutdown, the approx. 60-second wait interval prior to the shutdown of the power supply is omitted.

Although this function reduces the wait times during startups and software installations, the UPS must always be enabled during standard operation!



CAUTION

Loss of data!

When this checkbox is activated, a safe shutdown will no longer be possible in the event of a power failure. The device switches off instantly!

**Command:** This dialog box provides for the linking and activation of an executable program (\*.exe; \*.bat) which is to be started and executed after the initialization of the shutdown. This is helpful in situations where applications failing to respond to the systemwide messages must be backed up and terminated. To this end, appropriate housekeeping and termination programs can be entered and activated in this dialog. If there are several programs, or if the programs require transfer parameters, they must be combined in a batch file and then entered.

The entry itself may not contain any invocation parameters, and the declared program itself must not initiate a shutdown!

Selecting the button **Default** returns all settings to their **default values**.



### **System Health**

This dialog section indicates the current readings for internal voltages, rechargeable battery voltage, system temperature and fan functions.



The register "System Health"

The **Battery Voltage** reading is updated only after a battery test. The battery test occurs automatically after a system start, and in 12-hour intervals thereafter; it can also be initiated by pressing the **Test Battery** button.

- The LED illuminates red when the voltage reading of the battery voltage measured under load is low.
- The LED illuminates green when the battery pack is fully functional.
- Excessive repetitions of the battery test will discharge the battery pack. Never perform more than 5 battery tests within a 24-hour period.

The following applies to **Fan Speed monitoring**:

- Red LED: Fan at standstill, or fan speed is too low or too high.
- Green LED: Fan is working properly.


Pressing the **StopAutoRefresh** button disables the automatic updating of measured readings, and the legend on the button changes to **Auto-Refresh** 

Pressing the **AutoRefresh** button again enables automatic measurement updating, again changing the legend on the button to **StopAuto-Refresh**.



### **About**

The value **Shutdown Count** displayed here indicates the number of times the UPS has already shut down the system. After more than 3000 forced shutdown cycles by the UPS, replacement of the rechargeable battery pack is recommended, but not later then the recommended maintenance rate (see section 8.2).

# 4 Installation

When installing the rho4.1/IPC 40.2, refer to the information on standards compatibility and operating conditions in sections 2.4 and 2.5.



#### **CAUTION**

Conditions hazardous to the product!

The ambient air must be free of elevated concentrations of acids, alkali, corrosives, salts, metallic vapours, or other electrically conductive pollutants.



### **DANGER**

The operational reliability of components designed to be installed in housings or control cabinets will be severely impeded if they are used or operated without having first been installed. Therefore, do not use or operate the IPC until it has been installed.


### 

- The use of silicon-based sealing compounds, adhesives and insulating agents is prohibited.
- Ensure that the installation is maintenance-friendly, i.e., that it provides unrestricted access to connections, cables and fuses.
- Precede all installation procedures by writing down the information on equipment rating plates. In the event that rating plates are hidden from view as a result of the installation, you will still have quick access to this information whenever required.

# 4.1 Dimensioned drawings

The rho4.1/IPC 40.2 may be installed at four mounting holes, e.g. in a switch cabinet. The corresponding dimensions can be taken from the following drawing:

The rho4.1/IPC 40.2 may be installed horizontal (electric supply on the left side) or vertical (electric supply on the top).

# 5 Electrical Connections

Please note that, with respect to all electrical connections, the terminal connection plans and work instructions provided by the machine manufacturer shall always be binding!

The system planner is also charged with providing and planning for the integration and implementation of required components, such as Emergency-STOP circuits, mains switches, etc., in accordance with the current state of the art and at the highest level of safety attainable.



### **CAUTION**

Risk of damage to system components through by insertion or removal of plug connectors on energized circuits!

Connections must be made only while the system is switched off.

Observe the following to prevent functional failures:

- Provide isolated 24 VDC and 0 V terminal bars inside the switch cabinet. With regard to cable routing, maintain a minimum distance of 10 cm (4 in.) from all power cables.
- Ensure that machine plant circuits and shutdown sequence are designed to power up control terminals and other industrial-duty components, e.g., CNC and PLC, simultaneously.

# 5.1 Protective Earth (PE) conductor & screening information



#### DANGER

Dangerous conditions, functional failures and equipment damage on machine plant caused by substandard potential equalization or screening properties between system components!

Potential equalization currents may not flow across the screening of interface cables.

- ★ The protective earthing conductors (earthing connections) of the system must be arranged in a tightly meshed grid. All components, control cabinet housings and doors, including the mounting plate, must be earthed.
- ★ The potential equalization lines / PE lines of all system components shall be kept as short as possible, thus providing low-resistance connections.
- ★ Install the PE lines, preferably electroconductively, on the mounting plate in the control cabinet. Both sides of the insulated installed PE rails must be connected to the mounting plate with max. 20 cm long, adequately dimensioned copper bands.

  Position the PE lines so that the length of the outgoing protective earth
  - conductor connections to the individual modules in the control cabinet does not exceed 1 m.
- ★ When specifying the PE wiring, ensure cross-sections that are sufficiently dimensioned. In this regard, also observe EN 60204, Part 1 (max. electrical resistance and testing PE wiring installations).
- ★ If at all possible, apply screening connections on both ends of a cable.
- ★ Ensure that equipotential equalization currents do not flow across interface signal lines via the shielded conductors. Therefore, prior to switching on the IPC for the first time, ensure correct potential equalization between devices that are to be interconnected. Do not forget the interfaces interconnecting devices at different locations (regardless of distance or power supply).



### DANGER

Dangerous shock currents due to poor PE connections! The effectiveness of PE connections must not be impeded by mechanical, chemical or electrochemical influences. Connections must be permanent and tight.

# 5.2 Interference suppression information

When designing the machine plant, observe and comply with governing regulations and statutory law with regard to interference suppression on individual components. This will increase the operational safety of the entire system.



#### **DANGER**

Dangerous conditions, functional failures and equipment damage on the machine plant caused by substandard EMC measures or line transient interference!

Install signal voltage cables at a sufficient distance from highvoltage cables (e.g., motor power cables). If this is not possible, separate metallic cable channels must be used.

The following sections are designed to provide you with a brief overview of possible interference suppression measures in the switch cabinet. Among these are, for example:


- Filter
- Spark quenching circuits
- Damping of inductive switching peaks
- Limitation of switching voltage of high-speed semiconductors
- Screening

To ensure optimum suppress interference, all of the above components should be taken into consideration because they are most effective when working in combination. In principle, interference suppression should be implemented as follows:

- Apply suppression measures as close to the source of interference as possible
- Use only components that are identified as interference suppressors
- Limit leakage currents in accordance with safety regulations
- Provide touch guards
- Prevent vibration fatigue breakage by providing secure mechanical support for interference suppressors.

To ensure that interference suppression measures are successful, electrical symmetry or asymmetry must also be taken into consideration. Besides symmetrical components of interference voltage that occur between the mains connection cables, asymmetrical interference voltages occur as well. They are caused by capacitive coupling of the interference source with the mains network.


The following diagram shows a standard interference suppression circuit. Here, the asymmetrical interference voltages are discharged to the housing via  $C_{\nu}$ . By contrast,  $C_{x}$  dampens the symmetrical interference.



# 7 Display- and Operating Components

# 7.1 Monitor and keyboard

For display and operation of the rho4.1/IPC 40.2 we recommend the especially for industrial uses developed control panels VDP 16.2, VDP 40.2 and VDP 60.1, which are connected via GIGABIT4 interface to the rho4.1/IPC 40.2. These control panels are available with different display sizes. They are equipped with a keypad or touch screen.


A detailed description you find in the corresponding documentation of the control panels.

To the rho4.1/IPC 40.2 you can also connect a standard monitor (connector XVGA), a PS/2 keyboard (connector XKeyb.) and a PS/2 mouse (connector XMouse).

If a VDP is used, the keyboard and mouse could only be connected to this device. The keyboard and mouse ports at the rho4.1/IPC 40.2 are inactive.



# 7.3 Reset button

# 8 Maintenance and Replacement

The rho4.1/IPC 40.2 control is maintenance-free. However, some components are subject to wear and must be replaced.

#### Maintenance schedule

Include the following tasks in your maintenance schedule:

- ★ At least once a year check that all plug-and-socket and terminal connections of the components are correctly seated and not damaged. Check that cables are not broken or crushed. Replace damaged parts immediately.
- ★ Check fans at least once a year.



#### **DANGER**

Risk of injury through rotating fan impeller! Keep hands and fingers clear, and do not insert any items into the fan impeller.

- ★ Ensure that the rechargeable batteries are fully functional. Enable automatic testing of the rechargeable battery during each restart by activating the so-called "Accu Test" option of the UPS control program.
- For wearing parts the function compatibility is ensured for min. 5 years.

## 8.1 Replacing the hard disk

The hard disk mounting frame is accessible by a flap. The hard disk can be replaced inclusive the mounting.



#### CAUTION

Loss of data!

Back up all required application data and operating system settings to an external storage medium!



#### **CAUTION**


Danger to the module!

All ESD protection measures must be observed when using the module! Prevent electrostatic discharges!

To safeguard application data, and to avoid the necessity of the time-intensive new installation of operating system and application programs following a hard disk replacement, the hard disk should be backed up at regular intervals.

Procedure to replace the hard disk:

- ★ Backup all neccesary user programs and operating system settings on an external data media or via the network connection.
- ★ Turn off the supply voltage.
- ★ Wait until the power supply performs an automatic shutdown after UPS operation (**UPS LED** on front panel illuminates **red** until UPS shuts down the power supply). If necessary, remove all connectors as well the rechargeable battery pack cable at connector X19.
- ★ Release the retaining screw of the hard disk mounting frame at the upper side of the rho4.1/IPC 40.2 (see illustration next page). Flap off the mounting frame a little and disconnect the ribbon cable after unlocking the suppressing spring. Now the hard disk mounting frame inclusive hard disk can be extracted.



Position of the hard disk mounting frame and retaining screw

- ★ The new hard disk is always delivered mounted in its mounting frame, and is installed in reverse of the sequence described above.
- Check if the connections of the ribbon cable at the hard disk and all interface connections are correctly seated. Check if the supply voltage is intact.
- ★ The new hard disk parameter are recognized by the system automatically. In the event that the operating system fails to start, shut off the power to the unit for at least 10 seconds and restart the system.
- ★ Once the operating system was properly installed from the Recovery-CD, the user data and operating system settings for standard operation must be restored.

## 8.2 Replacing the rechargeable battery pack



#### CAUTION

Before replacing the battery, back up important data. If there is a voltage dip while the battery is being replaced, data in the RAM will be lost.

The battery pack must be replaced when

- The battery test during system start has failed.
- The total number of charging cycles (see "Shutdown Count" option in the UPS program, page 3–14) exceeds the value in the table below.
- The red **UPS** LED on the front panel is flashing for more than 8 hours (refer to page 2).

A charging cycle is defined by switching the power on/off.

A harmful deep discharge of the rechargeable battery pack is prevented as long as the rho4.1/IPC 40.2 is connected to mains power.

The number of charging cycles of the battery pack and thus its lifetime depends on the ambient temperature of the battery pack.

The ambient temperature is defined as temperature, in which the battery pack is used, e.g. the internal temperature of the PC or the internal temperature of the switch cabinet.

See the following table for approximate values:


Ambient temperature	Charging cycles	Maintenance period

The used battery packs are recycable, and can be returned to Bosch Rexroth upon replacement. They must not be disposed of in standard residential refuse.


For the rho4.1/IPC 40.2 an external rechargeable battery pack for switch cabinet assembly is available.

For connection pre-converted cables with a length of 1,0 m and 3,0 m are available from Bosch Rexroth.



To connect the external battery pack proceed as follows:

- ★ Mount the battery pack in the switch cabinet
- ★ Switch off the supply voltage of the rho4.1/IPC 40.2. If necessary remove all connectors at the rho4.1/IPC 40.2.
- ★ Plug the 2-pole battery pack connection cable to the terminal X19 at the rho4.1/IPC 40.2. The original cable is polarity reversal secure.





#### **DANGER**

Polarity reversal of the rechargeable battery packs will result in an F10A (5x20) fuse being triggered on the power supply module.

During the charging phase the discharged battery pack does not provide sufficient UPS protection enabling safe and controlled PC shutdown. Therefore, install fully charged batteries if at all possible.

#### Testing the new battery pack

- ★ Switch on the supply voltage of the rho4.1/IPC 40.2.
- ★ Pay attention to the LED "UPS" at the front panel:
  - battery pack already charged: UPS-LED off
  - battery pack discharged: UPS-LED flashes red
- ★ Wait approximate 5 hours until the battery pack is charged and the UPS-LED expires.

## 8.3 Expansion cards

The unit provides 1 slot for PCI bus- and 1 Slot for PCI or ISA bus-expansion cards:

• 1 PCI bus slot (max. length 180 mm)

• 1 combination slot (PCI or ISA bus) (max. length 180 mm)

Expansion slot no. 2 is occupied by the PCI\_rho card. Busmaster cards must be inserted in slot 1 (1st slot from the bottom).



#### **CAUTION**

Damage to PC or expansion cards through electrostatic discharges!

All ESD protection measures must be observed. Prevent electrostatic discharges!






# 8.3.1 Installing an expansion card

- ★ Switch off the power to the unit. Unplug all connectors if required.
- ★ Wait until the power supply performs an automatic shutdown after UPS operation (**UPS** LED on front panel illuminates **red** until UPS shuts down the power supply).
- ★ Remove the battery pack cable at X19.
- ★ Open the upper cover plate. For that purpose remove only the fastening screws on the side of the expansion card slots; then this part of the cover can be opened.

- ★ To close the air gap, a covering cap is assembled. Remove this part.
- ★ Remove the mounting screw holding the slot cover.
- ★ Insert the expansion card, and secure it with the mounting screw.

- ★ Reassemble the covering cap.
- ★ Reassemble the cover plate.

★ Attach the battery pack cable.



#### CAUTION

Destruction of expansion card or main board.

The ISA/PCI combination slot must never be populated with an ISA card and PCI card at the same time!

If the card is Plug-and-Play (PnP) compatible, it is automatically recognized and integrated in the system, provided this creates no hardware conflicts (IRQ, etc.) with other expansion cards or connected devices.

In the event that subsequent to a system reboot the functions based on the newly added card are not available, there may be several reasons for this:

- The card is not properly seated in the PCI or ISA slot contacts.
- The software driver for the card is not installed or its installation is faulty.
- IRQ (interrupt) conflict with other PC hardware components.
- The software for the card has not been installed.



#### CAUTION

Destruction of main board or ISA cards through address conflicts (IRQ, memory access, I/O address)!

Observe the information provided by the card manufacturer. You may have try out new configuration settings in both BIOS and operating system.


# 8.3.2 Installing an Introcard

Follow the procedures as described in section 8.3.1. In addition, you will be required to perform the following steps:

- ★ Remove both screws from the Introcard mounting bracket.
- ★ Insert card into uppermost expansion slot (ISA slot).
- ★ Align mounting bracket and expansion card so that the card is properly seated in the ISA slot.
- ★ With card inserted and securely pressed home, carefully replace and tighten screws of mounting bracket.
- ★ Using screws, attach Introcard mounting bracket to unit housing.

# Selecting address for Introcard

★ The preferred position for the address jumper on the Introcard is address 278 (LPT2).



## 9.4 Touch-Screen-Software

The control panels VDP 16.2 as well as VDP 40.2 have a built in touch screen, which allow operation by a touch sensitive surface.




